The Genesee County Legislature is very proud that the GCEDC has been the driving force of our various economic development successes. Site selectors, developers and real-estate agents recognize Genesee County as an emerging market linking the Buffalo and Rochester metropolitan regions.

The GCEDC and the Genesee County Legislature are strong partners in developing an environment which is, and will continue to be, vibrant and competitive. WNY STAMP Infrastructure Deployment Update

Completion of the construction of the Phase I water project is anticipated soon. The next phase of the water project will expand water capacity at STAMP to 1 Million Gallons Day (MGD) and is expected to begin in 2018. Various residences in the town of Alabama have benefited from this project.

The GCEDC is in the design phase for the construction of a 115kV electric substation which will serve as the foundation as ultimately STAMP will have over 500MW of energy capacity when fully built out.

With the main entrance roadway completed in 2017, the next phase of road construction will soon take place where top course paving will be completed along with the turning lane on New York State Route 77/63 into the site.

As we are learning throughout this process, the more shovel ready a site can be made, the more successful our chances are at landing an advanced manufacturing company to start operations at STAMP.


CHAMPIONING THE BUFFALO-ROCHESTER METRO CORRIDOR

This regional approach has a laser-like focus on attracting new capital investment and jobs. Through this collaboration and stewardship being demonstrated by InBN and GRE, the Buffalo and Rochester metropolitan region is poised for economic successes now and in the future.

2017 HIGHLIGHTS

Food and Beverage Flourish in Genesee County



0-AT-KA MILK PRODUCTS

For the third time in six years O-AT-KA Milk Products is expanding their operations with the construction of a 20,000 square-foot addition. To meet growing customer and industry demands for ready-to-drink beverages, the cooperative will install a new retort beverage production line at its facility located at the corner of Cedar and Ellicott in the City of Batavia. With the goal of being a dairy industry leader, O-AT-KA Milk Products continues to grow their capabilities and team of over 400 employees at their 600,000+ sq. ft. facility.

O-AT-KA adds value to milk by producing dairy ingredients and dairy-based beverages. The quality and freshness of O-AT-KA's milk supply come from its two dairy cooperative owners – Upstate Niagara Cooperative and Dairy Farmers of America. The fact that 90% of the cooperatives supply comes from within a 100-mile radius of Batavia ensures premium quality of all products and contributes to the livelihood of our region's farming community.

HP HOOD

On July 11, 2017 Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced the sale of the former Muller Quaker Dairy plant in the Genesee Valley Agri-Business Park to dairy processor HP Hood LLC. The plant, which was originally constructed by Muller-Quaker to process yogurt, was later purchased by DFA, a national, farmerowned dairy cooperative in 2016. HP Hood will invest more than \$200 million over several years and create 230 new jobs over five years.

The entire region is thrilled by the commitment from one of the nation's most prominent dairy companies. Food & Beverage growth and company attraction is a key strategy for the GCEDC as well as the Buffalo-Rochester Metro Corridor and the Finger Lakes Regional Economic Development Council.

FRESHLAB RESTAURANT INCUBATOR

Inside the JJ Newberry building in Batavia the FreshLAB Restaurant Incubator will open the doors this spring 2018 with two new restaurants and anchor tenant Eli Fish Brewing Company. FreshLAB is a first of its kind restaurant incubator program developed by the Batavia Development Corporation to address the dining and entertainment sales leakage in Genesee County.

As for Eli Fish Brewing Company, three Batavia natives pay homage to Eli Fish, who operated Fish's Malt House, a brewery located on the corner of Elm and Main Streets in the 1800s. The brewery, which reportedly had the capacity to produce 16,000 barrels of beer annually in 1883, burned many times during Fish's ownership, with Fish rebuilding it each time at the same location. Eli Fish Brewing Company is led by Batavia natives Matthew Gray, owner of Alex's Place in Batavia, as well as Buffalo Brothers Pizza and Wing Co. in North Carolina, Jon Mager, a third-generation owner in Arctic Refrigeration in Batavia, and Matthew Boyd, a partner in both Alex's and Buffalo Brothers Pizza and Wing Co., who oversees Buffalo Brothers' five North Carolina locations.

Another exciting facet of this project includes the rehabilitation of upper floor apartments above the FreshLAB restaurant incubator.

MANNING SQUIRES AND HENNIG

Manning Squires and Hennig, a family owned construction firm and general contractor since 1958, is expanding their corporate office and maintenance facilities in the town of Batavia. The company, started by two local masons, has grown into a large team of seasoned professionals that is one of the best masonry contractors in the region. Manning Squires and Hennig is investing over \$600,000 to construct a 9,000 sq. ft. of additional space and renovating their current offices.




